Overview


In August 2024, there were around 139,100 people employed in Northern Territory. The 5 largest employing industries in Northern Territory were Health Care and Social Assistance, Public Administration and Safety, Education and Training, Construction and Retail Trade. Together these 5 industries accounted for 60% of all employment.

Over the year to August 2024, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 12.5% to stand at 26,000
- Public Administration and Safety rose by 10.7% to stand at 21,500
- Education and Training fell by 7.6% to stand at 14,200.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in Northern Territory, 79% of workers were employed full-time; 69% were Female; and the median age of the workforce was 38. Around 56% of employed persons in this industry were located in Greater Darwin.


Employment by industry, August 2024 and August 2023




Employment characteristics by Industry

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?





Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?





Employment Region Industry profile

Darwin Employment Region

Overview


In August 2024, there were around 86,700 people employed in the Darwin Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Public Administration and Safety, Construction, Education and Training, and Retail Trade. Together these 5 industries accounted for 57% of employment in the region.

Over the year to August 2024, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 13.5% to stand at 14,500
- Public Administration and Safety rose by 17.1% to stand at 13,100
- Construction rose by 5.9% to stand at 7,800.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in the Darwin Employment Region, 79% of workers were employed full-time; 72% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 37.

Employment by industry, August 2024 and August 2023






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

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
