Note regarding labour force data for the Broome, Esperance, Geraldton and Kalgoorlie Employment Regions

These Employment Regions fall within the Western Australia – Outback (North and South) SA4. This SA4 is very large and covers much of regional and remote WA, including Broome, Esperance, Geraldton and Kalgoorlie. The WA Outback SA4 is a poor fit for these Employment Regions but is the only data readily available for the labour force. As a result, the labour force data for the Western Australia – Outback (North and South) SA4 is presented for each of these Employment Regions.

Overview


In August 2024, there were around 1,608,700 people employed in Western Australia. The 5 largest employing industries in Western Australia were Health Care and Social Assistance, Construction, Mining, Education and Training and Retail Trade. Together these 5 industries accounted for 51% of all employment.

Over the year to August 2024, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 16.2% to stand at 244,400
- Construction rose by 3.3% to stand at 149,400
- Mining fell by 9.5% to stand at 148,600.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in Western Australia, 55% of workers were employed fulltime; 78% were Female; and the median age of the workforce was 42. Around 84% of employed persons in this industry were located in Greater Perth.


Employment by industry, August 2024 and August 2023


Five largest employing industries: key statistics



Overview


In August 2024, there were around 118,900 people employed in the Broome Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Mining, Health Care and Social Assistance, Education and Training, Retail Trade, and Construction. Together these 5 industries accounted for 56% of employment in the region.

Over the year to August 2024, employment in:

- Mining fell by 24.0% to stand at 21,800
- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 32.6% to stand at 14,100
- Education and Training rose by 45.5% to stand at 11,500.

In Mining in the Broome Employment Region, 93% of workers were employed full-time; 78% were male; and the median age of the workforce was 38.







































Employment by industry, August 2024 and August 2023






