# **Employment Region Industry profile**

# Hobart and Southern Tasmania Employment Region

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#### Overview


In August 2024, there were around 151,500 people employed in the Hobart and Southern Tasmania Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Public Administration and Safety, Construction, Accommodation and Food Services, and Education and Training. Together these 5 industries accounted for 56% of employment in the region.

Over the year to August 2024, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 3.3% to stand at 26,100
- Public Administration and Safety rose by 4.5% to stand at 15,500
- Construction rose by 13.2% to stand at 15,100.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in the Hobart and Southern Tasmania Employment Region, 52% of workers were employed part-time; 77% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 41.


